DEVONPORT - Kaye Dixon.


President Peter and Secretary Heather have been touring Northern Queensland, and one assumes that the nomads are not lost.

THE ALAN PADGHAM STORY

Alan Padgham has been involved with Apex 40 from the time in July 1973 when forming an organisation to continue the Apex Fellowship was an idea in the minds of a few. Since then Alan has become a household name in Apex 40 through his many years of assisting Alan Kinder with the Roaring 40's, being in charge of the Apex 40 Website and attending many Rorts.

Our spies have been busy digging and the following story gives an insight into the early years of a man who has put a considerable effort into Apex 40.

In December 1931 Alan Padgham Snr. and his wife Ruth welcomed their third son into their lives. Alan was a strapping 10 lb 7oz baby, a younger brother for Douglas and Kenneth.

The early years were spent at Balwyn, approximately 10km northeast of the Melbourne city centre. The family then moved to nearby Surrey Hills. By age 7 Alan had two girlfriends and he couldn't decide which one was his favourite. The boys found how to produce hydrogen by reacting hydrochloric acid with spent zinc toothpaste tubes in Stone Ginger Beer bottles. The liberated gas was caught in balloons. With older brother Doug, Alan would climb to a high nearby tower and release the balloons and watch them drift on the wind. Each balloon had a card attached asking for the finder to advise where it came to rest.

Alan was always excited about receiving replies to these cards from people who seemed to live vast distances away. Cigarettes could be made from pencil shavings wrapped in rice paper. There was always plenty happening in the street and life was never boring. Trimming the Pussy Willow Tree was a never ending job and it was fun to hide in the top of the tree and scare any pedestrians.

The baker would arrive in his ornately decorated horse drawn cart with the delicious smell of newly baked bread. The iceman would arrive to replenish the ice chest. Early in the morning the clip clop of the milkman's horse would cease at the gate. The Milkman read his instructions and tipped the requested amount in the family milk-billy. If the milk-billy lid was not put on properly snails would crawl in or a stray cat would help themselves to an early breakfast.

A big steamroller would compact the road a few times a year. The steamroller driver was never as friendly to curious children like the men on the icecart. Alan's father was the Melbourne manager for the Sanitas X-Ray Company and bought out the principals of the company. Next move was to a rented house down the road, soon after the outbreak of the World War II. Alan had the responsibility of dropping off the seventeen shillings and sixpence (\$1.75) to the estate agent every Saturday morning.

Alan Padgham Snr came under the surveillance of the authorities because of his involvement with a German company. His great sense of humour prompted him to answer the phone sounding German. "Just to give them something to worry about" he would remark. Sadly Alan Snr. died, at age 44 years, with his wife Ruth at his bedside in 1942. Alan Snr. succumbed to injuries after an electrical accident at the Royal Melbourne Hospital.


Ruth Padgham worked very hard to raise her family and make ends meet. Perishable food had to be bought daily and there was food and clothing rationing and families needed coupons as well as money. With his Billy Cart in tow Alan would scour the streets for horse manure for the garden or drag it to buy wood, briquettes or coke for the fire. School was a 20 minute walk away for Alan. Being Protestants living next to a Catholic Convent and near a Catholic School meant for plenty of verbal debate with the local children for Alan and his brothers.

School was never a favourite part of Alan's life but he thoroughly enjoyed joining the workforce in spite of working a 49 hour week. As an apprentice

lithographic dot etcher Alan received the princely sum of twenty seven shillings and sixpence (\$2.75).

Alan for a short time also had a part time job as an usher at a picture theatre. A suit was required for the job and the only one he had access to was kindly lent to him by a much shorter and more corpulent person. His short sighted vision caused problems for him to accurately locate the correct seat rows. Patrons were soon being allocated already taken seats and confusion reigned supreme. Alan was banished from the theatre and the rest of the staff was called in to move in and reseat everybody. At the time he did not know that he was destined for much greater things.

The print and advertising industry became his forte. His expertise covered all areas of the print and pre-print spectrum. Alan is a Fellow of the Lithographic

Society of Australia and for 15 member. vears a President for 3 years, of the Working Group for Finished various Art at **TAFE** Colleges. Alan worked for Show Ads for many years and helped the company gain an international reputation.

Jan came to Australia in 1963 on a working holiday. Her ideas of returning home soon changed when she met and married Alan. Their son Ian was born in 1964. Alan joined the Apex Club of Bayswater in 1965 and he received Life Membership of the Club in 1972.

Daughter Tracey was born in 1967. Jan and Alan have two grandchildren, Alan and Zoe. In 1980 Alan set up his own company handling his clients work from concept to print. His expertise includes design, photography, copywriting, typesetting, computer art and supervision to the final print stage.

Alan's knowledge in these fields shows he is a very handy fellow to look after our Apex 40 website. The efforts of this very humble man are truly appreciated.
